## 3. WELCOME MESSAGE FROM THE ACTING PRESIDENT, MR. DAVID KOH

It gives me great pleasure to welcome all of you and thank you for making the time to attend our 44<sup>th</sup> STF AGM.

The last year was indeed very challenging in many aspects, given the challenges and constraints by the COVID-19 pandemic.

As a consequence of the precautionary measures to manage the risks of transmission, our physical Taekwondo training had to be reduced and even suspended. However, the resilience of our athletes and coaches prevailed and we persevered and continued with online training and modified training.

STF reached out to our affiliates with the following initiatives:

- a. allow higher poom/dans to send grading videos (up till 3<sup>rd</sup> dan) to STF
- b. coaches were also allowed to conduct gradings for the lower belts, and when necessary online
- c. For higher dans (4<sup>th</sup> and above), STF conducted small-group physical gradings twice a vear
- d. Poomsae Coaching courses with limited class sizes were also conducted in March 2021

#### STF SUSPENSION

Next, I will touch on the STF suspensions. The Board have been working very closely with the Interim Management Committee (IMC) and SSI in our efforts to be reinstated. We appreciate IMC's guidance as we establish and practice good governance so that the IMC can recommend to WT to lift the suspension of STF at the appropriate time.

## **OTHER MILESTONES/MATTERS**

At the last STF AGM in September 2021, we arrived at several significant milestones. It was done online and 9 very committed and dedicated Board members were elected, with a common purpose of serving the fraternity and making a positive difference.

For the first time, an Athlete's Commission Chairman was elected by eligible national athletes to give our national athletes a voice on the Board. We are glad to welcome Mr Lawren Poh in his new role.

The Secretariat was also rejuvenated with the hiring of our new CEO, Mr Phoi Kwok Eng, Operations Manager, Mr Kang Rui Jie (SEA Games Gold Medallist in 2015) and Ms May Chan, Finance Executive. STF will like to put on record our appreciation for Ms. Rosalind Ng for her years of service.

The year ended in sadness, with the loss of our former STF President Mr. Milan Kwee. A loss not just for Singapore Taekwondo but to World Taekwondo and the Singapore sporting fraternity. We all mourned the passing of a great leader who had actively contributed and inspired selflessly.

We end the year as it started, with COVID-19 looming over our heads. It is still uncertain how long COVID-19 will affect us. I urge members to stay vigilant and comply with the safe management measures mandated by the authorities. STF will assess the situation and hope that we can organize tournaments and courses in the upcoming year.

Lastly, the Board will like put on record its appreciation to everyone for their cooperation and support for the last year and we look forward to another year ahead.



## 6.7.2 Financial Reserve Policy

- 6.7.3 The charity has a reserve policy for long-term stability of the operations and it ensures that there are sufficient resources to support the charity in the event of unforeseen circumstances. As a general rule of thumb, the charity has 6 years of operational expenditure kept as reserves. The reserve level is reviewed yearly by the Board to ensure that the reserves are adequate to fulfil the charity's continuing obligations.

- 5.1.3 There is no paid staff who are close members of the family of the Executive Head or Board Member, who receives more than \$50,000 during the year.


## 5.2 Summary of Financial Performance for the Financial Year ended 31 March 2021


There has been a reduction of \$893 746 in this year's income when compared with last year. This is due to the significant drop in the fixed deposit interest rates.

There has been a reduction of \$450 878 in expenditure due reduction in number of STF events due to the Covid-19 pandemic restrictions.

There has been a surplus of \$111 919 for the year.


The accumulated funds is reported at \$6 514 885 and not in deficit.

#### **8 GOVERNANCE**

#### 8.1 Conflict Of Interest

## 8.1.1 IPC - Conflict of Interest Policy

All Board members and staff are required to comply with STF's conflict of interest policy. The Board has put in place procedures to declare actual or potential conflicts of interests on a regular and need-to basis. Board members also abstain and do not participate in decision-making on matters where they have a conflict of interest.

The following "Conflict of Interest" policy is practiced by the Board.

"Board members are expected to avoid actual and perceived conflicts of interest. Where Board members have personal interest in business transactions or contracts that the Federation may enter into, or have vested interest in other organizations that the Federation have dealings with, they are expected to declare such interests to the Board as soon as possible and abstain from discussion and decision making on the matter. Where such conflicts exist, the Board will evaluate whether any potential conflicts of interest will affect the continuing independence of the Board member and whether it is appropriate for the Board member to continue to remain in the Board."

All members declared that, as best they know and belief, and under no circumstances that they are aware of what may be construed as a direct or indirect conflict of interest.

#### 8.2 Term limit of Board

8.2.1 The Elected Board members shall serve 4 years. However, for the 1<sup>st</sup> year of the new constitutional change, 5 Elected Board Members will serve a 4-year term and 4 with the lowest votes will serve a 2-year term. The Independent Board Members shall serve 2 years. Board Members may serve a maximum of 8 consecutive years (from 2017), after which, shall only be eligible for re-election after a 2-year lapse. The Treasurer can only serve 4 years and may only be considered for re-appointment as a Treasurer after a lapse of at least 2 years. The 4-year term has been discussed and passed as a resolution to be included in the Constitution. This is to provide Board members with a longer runway to translate and operationalise strategic plans.

## 8.4 Review And Commentary

Due to the presence of COVID-19, year 2020 continued to be a challenging year forthe Federation.

To reduce the impact of COVID-19, Singapore underwent a Circuit Breaker from April 2020 till June 2020. Many physical activities were stopped, including the conduct of physical Taekwondo classes. Our affiliates either had to suspend their classes totallyor shift their classes online. This was unprecedented but the resilience of our coaches and students shone through and they adapted to the new environment. As the number of cases waxed and waned, and safe management measures were tightened orrelaxed accordingly, our affiliates did their best to keep things safe while continuing to provide their best for their students.

STF made several decisions to reduce the impact of COVID-19 measures. During the Circuit Breaker, besides allow higher poom/dans to send grading videos (up till 3<sup>rd</sup> dan)to STF, coaches were also allowed to conduct gradings for their lower belts online. Forhigher dans (4<sup>th</sup> and above), STF also conducted small-group physical gradings twicea year so that the higher dans continue to have opportunities to upgrade their rank. Poomsae coach courses with limited class sizes were also conducted in March 2021to allow aspiring coaches to upgrade their knowledge and be certified.

In September 2020, STF conducted its first AGM after the changes in the constitution. The AGM was also special as this was the first AGM conducted after our suspension and it was conducted online due to COVID-19. A strong slate of nominees stood for election and 9 board members were elected. Also, for the first time, an Athlete's Commission Chairman was elected by eligible national athletes to give our national athletes a voice on the board. All these were under the watchful eye of our CEO Mr. Phoi Kwok Eng, who was appointed in late August 2021.

Besides Mr. Phoi, STF also hired its first Operations Manager, Mr. Kang Rui Jie, our SEA Games 2015 gold medalist in February 2021. Ms. May Chan was also hired to assist Ms. Rosalind in preparation for her planned retirement. STF will like to put on record our appreciation for Ms. Rosalind Ng for her years of service.

The year ended with sorrow with STF receiving news of the sudden demise of Mr. Milan Kwee. His death was a blow not just to Singapore Taekwondo but to World Taekwondo and the whole Singapore sporting fraternity. We all mourned the passingof a great leader who had provided astute leadership and made countless contributions during his tenures as our President.

We end the year as it started, with COVID-19 looming over our heads. It is still uncertain how long COVID-19 will affect us. We urge members to stay vigilant and comply with the safe management measures mandated by the authorities. STF will assess the situation and hope that we can organize tournaments and courses in the upcoming year.

Lastly, the Board will like put on record its appreciation to everyone for their cooperation and support for the last year and we look forward to another year ahead.
